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President's report to the History Queensland committee meeting held on 13 February

In January I attended a further AFFHO (Australasian Federation of Family History Organisations) council meeting. Directors' insurance was again discussed and the new AFFHO President asked that all State associations represented on the council advise whether their association carried directors' insurance. On behalf of HQ, AFFHO was advised that we did not have this cover, but that investigations would be undertaken to ascertain whether such insurance was necessary.

AFFHO is looking for a person to fill the position of convenor for National Family History Month (August). Our patron, Shauna Hicks is the convenor of the Nick Vine Hall Award offered by AFFHO annually (in two categories based on membership numbers) for the best family history journal or newsletter.

With regard to the Congress in 2025 (in conjunction with Conference), AFFHO advised that Martin Killion and Heather Guernsey (from the Society of Australian Genealogists) had offered assistance to the Conference Planning Committee.

I have also been attending regular monthly meetings of the Conference/Congress planning committee, both as HQ representative and also as AFFHO representative. The website was launched on 5 February 2024 and planning is well advanced. David Barnes' report has been circulated and there will be a discussion later relating to the provision of backboards to assist stall-holders.

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Your members will need to download the Zoom application onto the device they intend to use (desktop, laptop, iPad, phone) - https://zoom.us/download.


To join a meeting, they just click on the link you send, or type in the meeting ID and passcode.




GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY OF QUEENSLAND INC BLOG — ARRIVAL OF THE ARTEMISIA

The *Moreton Bay Courier*, on 16 December 1848, enthusiastically welcomed the *Artemisia*, the first immigrant vessel to arrive in Brisbane direct from England. Instead of placing the notice in the shipping intelligence column, the paper provided extensive news about it in 'a place of honour.'

The importance of the *Artemisia*

At the time of the 1846 census, the population of the County of Stanley (Moreton Bay), Brisbane and surrounding areas – excluding indigenous people – was only 1599. Although the settlement had been open to free settlers since the beginning of 1842, business, agricultural and pastoral activity had not really grown. Furthermore, Moreton Bay came under the authority of the NSW Government, which showed minimal interest in developing infrastructure in this place of poorly constructed, deteriorating convict buildings. The main opportunity seemed to lie in increasing the population and skills to a point where Moreton Bay could become self-governing. Settlers had been trickling in from the southern regions of Australia but large numbers direct from Britain and Europe were seen as providing the desirable impetus.



The Artemisia's departure

The departure of the first immigrant ship to Moreton Bay received attention in England too, most notably by the Illustrated London News, 12 August 1848, pp94 and 96. The paper explained that it was focused on the contemporary issue of mass migration.

DAYBORO "The Town Of Yesteryear" HISTORICAL TOWN WALK

1. "DAYBORO COTTAGE"

Built in 1900 for John Storie, a merchant from Brisbane, as one of three sawmill workmen's cottages. It is the oldest residence in Dayboro on its original site

2. "HAY COTTAGE"



Built on property at Rush Creek for Mr. E.A.M. Goertz abt. 1871, and sold to Charles Hay in the 1890s, it is the oldest building in the district. It was relocated in 1989 to the site which had previously been occupied by another of the

awmill workmen's cottages and then the Railway Station

3. TERRORS CREEK CREAMERY

Built in 1897, it is the oldest original building in Dayboro. Farmers brought their milk to be separated. The cream was then transported to the Samsonvale Butter Factory. The building was later extended and used as the office for the Dayboro Butter

4 & 5 SILVERWOOD BUTTER FACTORY & STORE

Dairy Factory Co. in 1916. The Butter Factory was destroyed by fire in 1929, was rebuilt and opened again in 1930. It closed in 1965. The Silverwood Store was built in 1906. The store



was duff in 1906. The store and residence were destroyed by fire in 1924. A house and timber storage shed were built on the site by Bob Stephens. The shed has housed a garage and service station since the mid 1930s.

7. E. S. & A. BANK

8. POST OFFICE ATTACHEDRESIDENCE The house was built abt. 1905

9. UNITING CHURCH

Originally the Presbyterian Church, it was built in 1900 adjacent to the Cemetery and moved to its present site in



10. BOOTMAKER



Built for Mr. F.E. (Ted) Long he local butcher, a bootmaker ousiness was opened in 1927 by ohn William Taylor. The uilding has housed a barber's shop, fruit & vegetable shop, loctor's surgery and accountant over the years

11 OLD CHEMIST SHOP

The original building on th site was destroyed by fire. The 1929 by Bob Stephens. It has had many uses including a baker's outlet, chemist shop residence, bootmaker, coffe

12. DAYBORO CAFÉ Built in 1937 for Mrs. Wilhelmin Heathwood, and originally known as the "Bluebird Cafe" it has been a café continuousl



13. DAYBORO COMMUNITY HALL

The Orange Hall was opened on 31 Dec 1908. It was bought by



a committee of residents, extended to footpath level, reopened in 1937 and known as the Dayboro Public Hall. It was taken over by the Pine 1980s

14 CROWN HOTEL

Built in 1913 by Francis James Hepburn to replace the earlier hotel built by James Kinkead Berry a little further along the street. In 1887 James Berry built a general store using bricks from the old sugar mill and, after several unsuccessful attempts, obtained the original Crown Hotel licence in 1892.

15. DAYBORO MEDICAL CENTRE

Built in 1912 for Robert Vellnagel as the residence adjacent to his store. It was used as a boarding house for many years.



16. ROBERT VELLNAGEL'S STORE



Built in 1912 as a general store, it was later divided into three shops, the largest section being a drapery for many years. Built in 1912 as a general store,

17. DAYBORO BUTCHERY

The original butchery in the township was established by Cruice Bros. abt. 1908. The business was sold to Mr. F.E. (Ted) Long in 1919. The resent building was built is



STATE LIBRARY OF QLD BLOG — AN IRONY OF THE 1918 ARMISTICE: A TALE OF A YOUNG SOLDIER

The armistice at the end of the First World War – 11 November, 1918 – had passed and Arthur Rowbotham had sent his Christmas cards so they would not crumple in his pack. He had enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force at Rockhampton on 3 October 1916 aged 21 and his service was later recorded in the Rockhampton newspaper in 1917.



Major Dibdin's account of what happened 12 days after the Armistice appeared on page 10 of the *Morning Bulletin*, Rockhampton, on 14 March 1919:

'A few days before his death he was evacuated to hospital with influenza, and it appears that he developed pneumonia, which has had horrible results with quite a lot of our original men. There were three others like your son who came away with the unit, went through everything, and then, while out resting, got influenza and died from it.'

The tragedy of the Spanish flu had struck Australian troops with sudden, deadly effect. Young men, recovering from the ravages of war, quickly slipped away. Arthur Rowbotham was just a month short of his 24th birthday. His Christmas cards arrived after his death. His few personal effects mentioned in his service record:

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND HISTORY SOCIETIES — MAXIMISING THE VALUE OF LOCAL HISTORY

HOW LOCAL GOVERNMENT CAN WORK WITH HISTORY SOCIETIES

Local government is the principal area of government that is served by and is responsible for supporting community history and heritage societies.

The proven economic and social value of history and heritage to local communities, together with the important role played by local historical societies, provides a strong case for local government and those societies to work together.

There is much unrealised potential for partnerships between local government and historical societies. That potential needs to be better acknowledged and the partnerships optimised. Local tourism, with its many spin offs, is often a major beneficiary.

Local government authorities recognise and support the work of these groups in many ways, although some with more appreciation of the benefits than others. To operate in a way that assists local governments maximise the benefits of local history and heritage, local history groups need:

- affordable premises with adequate space for their administrative operations, secure collection storage, museum displays, public meetings, etc. (These premises need to meet minimum standards for museums and galleries (see National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries.)
- funding for essential equipment such as scanners, computers, projectors, storage, signage, display mountings
- funding to cover operational costs such as utilities
- insurance coverage e.g. for volunteers, public liability, buildings and contents
- support for projects to:
 - ▶ □ enhance collections
 - ➤ □ conserve and digitise material
 - ➤ □ curate and present displays
 - > publish research and information about their collections

BEST PRACTICES FOR GENEALOGY FUTURE PROOFING

In summary, here are some tips for future proofing your genealogy research and making sure it is preserved for others to use for generations to come:

- Take inventory. Determine what you have, and this includes hard copy as well as digital assets and online sites.
- Include in estate planning. Create a codicil to your will or make sure there is some form of instructions concerning your genealogy research.
- Backup your data. Backing up your genealogy data is a good habit for the living, and it will keep all your info in one place for your executor.
- Futureproof your technology. CD-ROM discs degrade over time. Negatives and movie films can fade and fall apart. Transfer items to digital ASAP.
- Have that conversation with your family. Be very clear about where your genealogy research is located, why it is important, and what you want done with it.
- Contact organizations. Determine which libraries, societies and archives will accept all or part of your collection. Donate items you don't need NOW.
- Post items online. Consider starting a blog even a private one to preserve your family stories. Do the same with a family tree on Ancestry or one of the popular genealogy sites.
- Do stuff NOW. Tell your own stories NOW. Write that genealogy book NOW. Interview family members NOW.

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE HOME OF THE KILCOY DISTRICT HISTORICAL SOCIETY



The Kilcoy Shire Historical Society was formed in 1998 in recognition for the need to actively collect and record social history of the community and district. It was decided as the first endeavour of the Society to publish a collection of photos of early Kilcoy. In what was a mammoth effort by all concerned enough photos and information were gathered to release in March of 1998, Volume 1 of a Pictorial Browse through early Kilcoy. To have managed to gather, collate and print this first volume in just 2 months is a testament to everyone involved. This pictorial book covered various images of Building & Scenes, Rural & Industry, Pioneers, In Uniform, Kilcoy Events, Sporting Events & Clubs, Transport, People and Weddings.

Another huge undertaking of the volunteers at KDHS was to interview and videotape many of the older residents of the Kilcoy area. These interviews can be viewed at the Hall of History. Since then, several thousand images have been scanned and indexed from private collections of more than 30 old stories captured on film of the town's pioneering residents and long-term elders. Collectively this important work has formed the basis of new and published materials such as the Pioneers of the District in 5 volumes, the War Service History of young men and women, and the visual representation of the main events and activities that have influenced the growth and development of the district, industries, transportation, sporting and social events, landscape, and war time involvement.

With the profits from the published volumes, a grant of \$29,000 from the Government, and the donated building from Hazeldean Union Church Committee, the church building was relocated to the eastern end of Yowie Park. It was repaired, repainted and with the considerable efforts of the many volunteers, brought to the stage you now see. Due to later development in Yowie Park, it was shifted, once again, to the western end of Yowie Park.







The establishment of this small museum in Yowie Park, Kilcoy Hall of History, is home of the Kilcoy District Historical Society and provides a special depository for the community's collection and a place where the community's past can be shared as widely as possible with local residents and visitors passing through.

TWO ANNIVERSARIES MEMBER SOCIETIES MAY WISH TO COMMEMORATE


1824-2024 — On 12 September 1824 the *Amity* arrived at Redcliffe. Among the 54 people on board were John Oxley, the first commandant of the Moreton Bay Penal Settlement (Lieutenant Henry Miller of the 40th Regiment of Foot), botanist Allan Cunningham, guards and about 30 convicts.

1924 -2024 — In 1924 the Queensland State Parliament passed the City of Brisbane Act to set up a single government in Brisbane. Before this, the Brisbane area had been divided up into 20 local authorities and joint boards. The act reduced the number of aldermen for the Brisbane area from more than 200 down to 20. The newly elected Council, headed by Brisbane's first Lord Mayor, William Jolly, took over the local administration on 1 October 1925.

Cemetery Symbols

Anchor: Anchors usually denote a maritime career, but when used on the grave of a non-maritime person they have a spiritual context. The anchor has a religious meaning going back centuries and was used as an early symbol of Jesus as 'hope', referring to the biblical passage, 'hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast..." (Hebrews 6:19). The three theological Virtues (human forms that represent core Christian values) include Faith, Hope and Charity, and the figure of Hope almost always has an anchor with her. When the anchor appears upside down it can be a sign that the grave is actually empty, and the person was lost at sea.

Anchors used to be secret crosses. When Christians first began to practice their religion, it was outlawed, and if caught practicing, they were persecuted (i.e. in Rome, their punishment was to provide "entertainment" in public arenas as they were forced to battle experienced warriors or wild animals). The anchor was a sign from one Christian to another as a profession of their faith, like a secret handshake or knock.

The anchor was a secret symbol for about 300 years. In 312, the Roman emperor Constantine had his vision of the Christian cross before the battle he won against the Turks. After his victory, he wholeheartedly

converted to Christianity, and the entire Roman empire was forced to follow suit. Christianity was no longer forced to exist behind closed doors.









\$5 BANKNOTE NEWS FROM REDCLIFFE NUMISMATIC SOCIETY INC



All Australians will be able to have their say on the design of the new \$5 note, with the Reserve Bank to begin seeking public input from next month.

The RBA announced last year it will replace the portrait of Queen Elizabeth II on one side of the note with a "design that honours the culture and history of the First Australians" following the monarch's death in 2022. The other side of the note will continue to show Parliament House in Canberra even after the redesign.

In an appearance before a parliamentary committee, governor Michele Bullock said the bank will take public submissions on the design from next month. "Last year, we announced that we would be taking the opportunity to feature a new design on the \$5 note that honours and celebrates the culture and history of First Nations peoples," she told the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Economics.

"As a first step in determining the design, we will be asking members of the public, over the course of March and April, to share with us what they think should be on our \$5 banknote to represent First Nations culture and history in Australia." She also said consultation with Indigenous communities over the design has already started. "In recent weeks, we have also begun visiting First Nations community organisations in key regional and remote locations across Australia and the Torres Strait, to engage with local communities about the theme nomination process.



LAW CHANGES FOR INCORPORATED ASSOCIATIONS, INCLUDING NOT-FOR-PROFITS

All incorporated associations need to be aware that legislative changes governing how we resolve internal grievances and disclose remuneration to our members come into effect on 1 July 2024.

The addition of a dispute resolution procedure to the model rules will take effect on 1 July. If a group already has a grievance procedure that complies with the one in the model rules, it can continue to be followed, but if it does not comply it will be invalid and the grievance procedure in the model rules must be followed. If a group does not have a grievance procedure it does not need to adopt one: the grievance procedure in the model rules will apply.

From 1 July, all incorporated associations will need to disclose remuneration and other benefits at their annual general meeting, even if the amount to report is zero. This applies to benefits and remuneration given to management committee members, senior staff, and their relatives. Remuneration and benefits may be disclosed as the total value given to all persons but must include the number of people who benefited.





Brisbane Tuff



What is Brisbane Tuff?

Brisbane Tuff is a volcanic sediment, welded ignimbrite actually, deposited in a single cataclysmic event. The lava, pumice and rock fragments were blown out of the volcano in a huge explosion. On landing they formed layers and were "welded" together by the extreme heat to form tuff.

Brisbane Tuff is NOT porphyry!!

Porphyry is an igneous rock formed when rising magma in a volcano is cooled near the surface under certain conditions. As a result it contains larger crystals than other magma. The word "porphyry" is Greek and means purple.

Brisbane Tuff is used as building stone, for kerbing and guttering as well as for roadmaking material.

All that remains of Windsor Council is a tuff old building:



Coopers Plains History Group



In 1826, a few years after the establishment of the Moreton Bay Penal Settlement, Captain Patrick Logan named land eight miles south of the Brisbane River penal colony 'Cowper's Plains'; an area explored by Logan and by Allan Cunningham in 1828. The honour was to Dr Henry Cowper, the Assistant Surgeon of the settlement.

The area that was to become known as Coopers Plains (changing the spelling of 'Cowper' and dropping the apostrophe), was a wide flat.

Cowpers Plains convict station

The first European settlement in what is now the Coopers Plains area was a convict station outpost of the early Moreton Bay penal colony. Its exact location is uncertain and there is no plaque commemorating it. In '1828 ... the Cowper's Plains convict outstation was established in an area on Stable Swamp Creek, somewhere close-by to where Musgrave Road now crosses the creek. The convict work gangs were used on the construction of the Limestone (Ipswich)-Brisbane road. When the penal colony closed down in around 1840, the outstation disappeared.'

Blackbutt and District Tourism and Heritage Association



In 2011 the Blackbutt and District Tourism and Heritage Association (BDTHA) was gifted the original Nukku State School. The building is now dedicated the Roy Emerson Museum.

With substantial help from the company Stanwell, and its Tarong Community Partnership Program, the building was relocated to the Rail Head at Blackbutt only a few miles from where it originally stood. The committee renovated the building thanks to financial assistance from community groups and additional fundraising. Events included the Nukku School Reunion; From Train Track to Walking Track -100 Years of Rail; displays and

other events to coincide with the Bloomin Beautiful Blackbutt Festival held in September each year.

The building now houses photos and articles relating to the history of Blackbutt, Benarkin, Taromeo, Googa Creek, Gilla and Nukku. The story boards describe the history of rail, timber, the Nukku State School and stories connected to the Australian tennis player, Roy Emerson. Roy Emerson completed all of his primary school education at the Nukku State School.
